




KDU Students Co-Authored and Published Book - The Hotshot Series: The Legal Line

The book, which was conceived when the students were pursuing their law studies at KDU, serves as a framework for aspiring lawyers to understand what is required of them to reach their fullest potential and give them a realistic view of what a career in the legal profession is all about.

The enlightening book provides end-to-end advice on choosing a law school, expectations as a lawyer and of the legal practice, career options, as well as input and anecdotes of those from and related to the field of law, such as practicing lawyers, judges, criminal litigators, law firm partners, bankers and consultants, amongst many others.

'The Hotshot Series: The Legal Line' is published by LexisNexis, and was launched in 2016 by Yang Berhormat Puan Hajah Nancy binti Shukri, Minister in the Prime Minister's Department.

MOOT COURT

The Moot Court at KDU is spaciouly designed, and allows students to carry out mooting competitions as well as mock trials, where students are able to mimic real court situations. Training at the Moot Court helps students apply what they have learnt into practice, moulding them into becoming independent law graduates with the ability to think outside-the-box.

LAW SOCIETY CENTRE

The Law Society Centre is located beside the Moot Court, it is the main office for the Law Society committee members. Day to day transition and proceedings would be dealt with in this particular office



LEGAL CAREER PATHWAYS

Law graduates from KDU are equipped with diverse knowledge and practical skills, and can choose to work in a traditional legal practice or beyond. At KDU, students will be guided on choosing elective subjects that will lead to their own preferential pathways. The two most common pathways for a law graduate are as in-house counsel (corporate lawyers) or as advocates and solicitors (practicing lawyers).

In-house Counsel (Corporate Lawyer)

In-house Counsel refers to lawyer employed by a business or organisation solely for in-house legal advisory work. Their primary objective is to serve the interests of the organisation, not the owners of the business or the executives who run it. Small corporations may retain one or two lawyers on staff, while larger corporations typically have numerous in-house counsel, each with their own specialty.

In addition to legal counsel, corporate lawyers are also called upon to provide business advice, whenever necessary. An in-house counsel's job scope may include drafting legal documents, reviewing new business contracts, consulting and handling corporate legal processes such as mergers and acquisitions, financial / securities offerings and intellectual property, guiding executives on regulatory and compliance matters, developing company policy, and such.

Advocates and Solicitors (Practicing Lawyers)

Advocates and solicitors focus mainly in dealing and representing clients before the court, and are self-employed specialist in their area of legality.

Prior to being qualified as a practicing lawyer in Malaysia, law graduates will need to undertake the Certificate in Legal Practice examination (Malaysia) or the Bar Professional Training Course (UK), and undergo 9 months of chambering.

The difference between an advocate and a solicitor is that advocates defend people in court, while a solicitor mainly advise clients, undertake negotiations and draft legal documents, and are confined to magistrate courts. Solicitors usually have specialist knowledge of different areas of the law, such as family law, property law, criminal law, employment law and such. On the other hand, an advocate is usually contracted by a solicitor on behalf of their clients. Advocates stand in higher levels of court and plead cases on behalf of their clients in front of a judge.



A PREVIEW OF UK BAR PROFESSIONAL TRAINING COURSE

SHAH ALAM, 6 March 2018 – With aim of enabling the law graduates from KDU Law School (KLS) to be named and practise as barristers locally as well as internationally, KDU College had recently organised the inaugural Pre-Bar Professional Training Course (Pre-BPTC) Advocacy in Malaysia with Mr Richard Clements, a law lecturer from Bristol, United Kingdom, in its campus at Damansara Jaya.

Held on 5 March 2018, this session was conducted for KLS students for the first time based on special request, which attended by about thirty law students. “This is the first Pre-BPTC that being held in the country, as there is no such advocacy session even in the United Kingdom,” stated Ms Evon Lim, the Head of KDU Law School.

In contrary to the full theoretical-based training of the Certificate in Legal Practice (CLP), BPTC comes as an alternative to Malaysian students, as BPTC provides students with advocacy training and group sessions that offer true-to-life mock trials, assessments, 'mini chambers' and real-life legal work experience opportunities that equip students with the advocacy, research, conference and mediation skills which they need to excel at the Bar and beyond.

“I was the presenter of one of the cases. It benefited me as I have to learn how to summarize what clients generally speak and to be very objective towards the matter at hands. The session was very straight forward and clear. Mr Richard tried to make condition very easily digestible for all of us since we are from different countries,” said Goh Shu Hwey Mellaney, a Year 1 Bachelor of Laws (LLB) student in KDU.

As for Nyasha Faith Tengende, a Year 2 LLB student who originated from Zimbabwe, opined that the Pre-BPTC Advocacy Training not only had helped her to recall in whatever she has been reading, but to help students with the recent development on cases which they have to put in their essay. “Mr Richard explained the cases in details. The session opened my eyes to see what practising is really mean and how the practising world is. I am planning to do BPTC in future definitely,” she said.

According to Ms Nalini Samudram, Lecturer of KDU Law School, Year 1 students in KDU are required to do case study and submit the work as part of their final examination, hence, the preview session of BPTC conducted by Mr Richard was very much similar to what KDU students have been doing in the module of 'Legal System and Methods', as KLS is always striving best to equip graduates by providing them the real world insights.




Mellaney Goh Shu Hwey (Class 2017) _____






